Why would she want that? We're not even sure if we will ever need to eat in heaven. So why would she need a fork.

She left behind this explanation...

Remember at family dinners how you would eat and then the table would be cleared before bring out the desserts. We were always told to hold on to our forks because the best is yet to come. The same is true for our eternal souls, the best is yet to come.

I. Our <u>present</u> sufferings

What is happening around us...

- A. Water At current consumption rates, it is possible that up to 3 billion people could be short of drinkable water by 2032. And yet people enjoying improved quality water increased from 4.1 billion to 4.9 billion in the last ten years.
- B. Soil At least 15% of the earth's surface has already been damaged by human activities. 10% of once tillable soil has been lost to overgrazing, deforestation, and development. And yet 10% of Earth's land is in protected areas, five times as much as 30 years ago.
- C. Disease There are 4 billion cases of preventable diarrhea each year, causing 2.2 million deaths per year. Two billion people are at risk from malaria, with 2 million dying annually from this disease. And yet from 1970-2000 the under-age-five global mortality rate fell from 96 to 56 per 1,000 births.
- D. Pollution Experts estimate that concentrations of carbon dioxide in the air will double by 2050. Half the world's rivers are seriously depleted and polluted. And yet the hole in the ozone layer is being repaired because of an 85% reduction in 114 countries in the use of harmful chemicals.
- E. Resource Management One third of the world's fish stocks are depleted or over-harvested. One fifth of the world's population consumes 90% of its resources. And yet in some countries the abandonment of farmlands has allowed forests to recover.
- F. Population Worldwide, 1 billion urban dwellers live in slums. Somewhat less than one half of the earth's population lives on less than \$2 per day. And yet while earth's population continues to increase in terms of total numbers of people, growth rates in most parts of the world have declined since the 1980's.
- G. Extinction of Animals -1,183 species of birds (12 percent of the world's total) are threatened with extinction. 1,130

species of mammals (25 percent of the world's total) are threatened with extinction. And yet a moratorium on commercial whaling since 1986 is allowing that species to recover.

My point? Yes, we have problems but there is hope. The best is yet to come.

* When I began to work on this message we had just come through the terrorist attacks at the Boston Marathon. We had the explosions at the fertilizer plant in Texas and then I read about the Canadians foiling a terrorist attack on their rail system. It almost seems like the world is deteriorating in our hands.

And yet, name a century that didn't include tragic events.

- The collapse of Rome
- The ups and downs of the Crusades
- The powerful Moslem conquest of Europe and Asia
- Civil wars
- World Wars
- The development of Atomic weaponry

How can we believe that the best is yet to come?
